COMMUNITY PLANNING ACTION PLAN AND SINGLE OUTCOME AGREEMENT ANNUAL PERFORMANCE REPORT 2010/11

Report by the Chief Executive

1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

- 1.1 The purpose of the report is to present for consideration and review, in respect of Council's interest, a summary of the consolidated annual performance report for 2010/11 in respect of the Community Plan thematic Action Plans and East Ayrshire Community Planning Partnership Single Outcome Agreement (SOA).

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The Governance and Scrutiny Committee will be aware that since 2003, a Community Plan Annual Performance Report, detailing progress in respect of the Community Plan thematic Action Plans and the actions contained within the Joint Officers' Group (JOG) Workplan, has been presented to Cabinet and the Community Planning Partnership (CPP) Board for consideration and endorsement in June/July each year.
- 2.2 Committee will also recall that Community Planning Partners in East Ayrshire prepared a three-year SOA (1 April 2008-31 March 2011) from the outset, which was approved by Cabinet on 26 March 2008, and signed off by all Community Planning Partners and the Scottish Government on 2 July 2008.
- 2.3 Following endorsement by Cabinet on 25 February 2009 and by all Community Planning Partners, East Ayrshire's updated SOA was approved by the Scottish Government on 16 June 2009, with the overall Ministerial sign off completed on 23 July 2009.
- 2.4 As part of the overall commitment to reporting performance, an annual performance report is prepared on progress towards the achievement of outcomes within the SOA, the first of which was endorsed by Cabinet on the 30 September 2009 and the CPP Board thereafter for subsequent submission to the Scottish Government.
- 2.5 In an effort to streamline annual reporting in respect of the Community Plan Action Plans and the SOA, and avoid duplication of activity, at its meeting on 18 March 2010, the CPP Board agreed that the timescales for reporting for the period 1 April 2009 to 31 March 2010 be aligned, with a consolidated Community Planning/SOA performance report to be submitted to the Council and the CPP Board in September 2010.
- 2.6 In respect of the 2010/11 position, an interim report was considered and endorsed by Cabinet on 29 June 2011 and the CPP Board on 30 June 2011.
- 2.7 Following endorsement of the consolidated Community Planning/SOA Annual Performance Report 2010/11 by the Council on 22 September 2011, it was agreed that the annual performance report, including improvement actions agreed at the CPP Board meeting of 29 September 2011, would be submitted as per normal

arrangements for consideration by the Governance and Scrutiny Committee at its meeting on 28 October 2011.

- 2.8 This report presents to Committee for consideration and review, a summary of the 2010/11 consolidated annual performance report in respect of the Community Plan thematic Action Plans and East Ayrshire Community Planning Partnership Single Outcome Agreement.

3. SOA ANNUAL REPORTING ARRANGEMENTS 2010/11

- 3.1 The 2010/11 SOA Annual Performance Report required to be submitted to the Scottish Government by the end of September 2011.

Components of the SOA Annual Review

- 3.2 As reported last year to Council, the national Concordat Oversight Group (COG) identified how reporting in respect of Single Outcome Agreements should be taken forward as follows:

- “The SOA Annual Report will be a factual statement covering progress against national and local outcomes. The report will be made in September each year, on the basis of data available from the previous financial year. The COG has issued a template which Councils and CPPs should use in presenting this information and one table should be used for each national outcome.”
- “The Annual Review is a qualitative assessment designed to provide the Council, the CPP and the Scottish Government with information about the effectiveness of the SOA approach.”

- 3.3 The following arrangements ensured compliance with the above guidance from an East Ayrshire perspective.

Community Planning/SOA Annual Performance Report 2010/11

- 3.4 As previously reported, an interim annual performance report summary for 2010/11 was approved by Cabinet at its meeting on 29 June 2011 and by CPP Board on 30 June 2011.
- 3.5 Subsequently, work was taken forward to update the interim report, as appropriate, and prepare the consolidated 2010/11 Annual Performance Report to meet the requirements of the guidance in respect of reporting on Single Outcome Agreements provided by the Scottish Government.
- 3.6 The Corporate Management Team fully considered and approved the 2010/11 consolidated Community Planning/SOA Annual Performance Report.
- 3.7 In addition, reporting template returns in respect of all health related outcomes were considered by the Community Health Partnership (CHP) Committee on 15 August 2011 and subsequently approved. Where data are not available, proxy indicators have been provided by NHS Ayrshire and Arran’s Policy, Planning and Performance Team, as appropriate.

- 3.8 The seminar convened for Elected Members on 24 August 2011 provided an opportunity for detailed discussion and feedback from members in respect of reported performance for 2010/11.
- 3.9 At its meeting on 22 September 2011, the Council considered and approved the draft Community Planning/SOA Annual Performance Report 2010/11, which reflected progress against 140 indicators; with three indicators identified where data were unavailable, with updates anticipated in this regard prior to the end of September 2011; and 19 indicators not reported. Work has continued to be taken forward on an ongoing basis to update data, as appropriate.
- 3.10 In this regard, data updates have been provided for two of the three indicators previously identified as unavailable and, as a consequence, the Community Planning/SOA Annual Performance Report has been updated. Data in respect of the remaining indicator was subsequently rescheduled for publication by late October 2011, therefore, would not be reported.
- 3.11 Consequently, at its meeting on 29 September 2011, the CPP Board approved a final position that from a total of 162 indicators included in the Annual Performance Report 2010/11 progress from an identified baseline position to March 2011 has been measured against a total of 142 indicators, which is summarised as follows:
- Improving progress (106 indicators – 74.7%)
 - Maintaining progress (8 indicators – 5.6%)
 - Improvement required (28 indicators – 19.7%).
- 3.12 In addition, a total of 20 indicators are not reported, for example, where comparable data are not available and where data are no longer collected.
- 3.13 The consolidated Community Planning/SOA Annual Performance Report 2010/11 received final endorsement from the CPP Board on 29 September 2011 and was subsequently submitted to the Scottish Government.
- 3.14 Attached at the Appendix to this report, for Committee's consideration, are all our performance indicators for the SOA listed in summary format and highlighting progress for 2008/09, 2009/10 and 2010/11 against identified baselines. A full copy of the finalised Community Planning/SOA Annual Performance Report 2010/11, including an updated summary report and a glossary of terms, is available at the Members' Information Point.

4. SOA IMPROVEMENT PLAN 2011/12

- 4.1 As previously reported to the Governance and Scrutiny Committee, where appropriate, actions were identified in respect of areas for improvement in the SOA Annual Performance Reports for 2008/09 and 2009/10 and remedial action taken forward to facilitate progress and achievement towards the local outcomes in our three year SOA by March 2011. In this regard, progress was reported to Cabinet on 15 December 2010 and Governance and Scrutiny Committee on 14 January 2011.
- 4.2 Remedial action to address areas identified for improvement in the 2010/11 annual performance report were considered by the CPP Board at its meeting on 29 September 2011 in the context of the three year SOA 2011-2014, which was implemented on 1 April 2011.

4.3 From a Council perspective, proposals in this regard set against identified indicators and informed by discussion at the Elected Members' Seminar on 24 August 2011 include the following:

- **Increase in business start up rate:** Continue to increase the provision of a range of co-ordinated support for small and medium enterprises across East Ayrshire.
- **Increase in percentage of young people into employment:** Increased focus on 18-24 year olds in relation to securing employment.
- **Increase in the percentage of economically active working age persons with qualifications:** Continue to maximise opportunities to increase the educational and vocational skills capacity of the local workforce through the Skills Development and Employability Service and links to local further and higher education establishments.
- **Reduction in claimant count unemployment:** Continue to maximise and co-ordinate available resources to ensure the ongoing development and implementation of employability opportunities for local people.

4.4 In addition, from a health perspective, draft actions in respect of areas identified for improvement regarding breastfeeding; respiratory disease and long term conditions; alcohol and drug related conditions; and mental health will be considered by the CHP and taken forward as appropriate, including the following:

- **Increase in the proportion of new born children exclusively breast fed at 6-8 weeks:** Continue to develop and roll out a model of peer support targeting communities with the lowest breastfeeding rates.
- **Reduction in the number of episodes of respiratory disease:** Further progress research and analysis in respect of long term conditions, the output from which will assist to focus future action in this regard.
- **Reduction in the number of alcohol related and attributable hospital patients; and reduction in the number of drug related hospital patients:** Concerted effort in relation to driving forward the alcohol and drugs agenda locally, moving from treatment to recovery, and a priority approach in relation to alcohol.
- **Reduction in the rate of anti-depressant prescribing:** Continue to promote and support a range of interventions for individuals experiencing depression, including the exercise referral scheme provided by the Council's Leisure Services, and self help services/therapies.

5. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

5.1 The degree of achievement of outcomes in the SOA will depend, in part, upon the level of financial resources which are made available to Community Planning Partners and the Scottish Government over the period.

6. COMMUNITY PLANNING/POLICY/LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

6.1 East Ayrshire Community Planning Partnership's Single Outcome Agreement is founded upon Section 20 of the Local Government in Scotland Act 2003. This sets out the Council's general power to advance well-being for its area and persons within that area. The general power is also supported with Statutory Guidance issues under section 21 of the Act and general guidance issues in support of the November 2007 Concordat.

6.2 The entire SOA is built upon an understanding of joint intent and accountability between Local Government and the Scottish Government. The November 2007 Concordat, and by implication the SOA, is not seen by COSLA, or the Council, as forming a contract enforceable in law.

7. RECOMMENDATIONS

7.1 The Governance and Scrutiny Committee is requested to:

- i) note that the SOA Annual Performance Report on progress made in 2010/11 was submitted to the Scottish Government on 30 September 2011;
- ii) from a Council perspective, consider and review the consolidated Community Planning/SOA Annual Performance Report for 2010/11 and, in particular, comment on the Improvement Agenda; and
- iii) otherwise, note the content of the report.
