**SAFER STREETS
STRATHCLYDE POLICE REPORT**

1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To advise Local Committee Members of Crime Figures and Police activity within their area. Community Constables will continue to report to their respective Community Councils with more detailed information. This meeting will also provide an opportunity for members to provide feedback to Strathclyde Police on areas of concern and to have these concerns addressed.

2. CRIME TRENDS

2.1 The following crime statistics relate to the area of East Ayrshire Beat's 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46 & 47.

They cover the period from 1 April 2005 to 30 November 2005.

Beat 41 Cumnock

There has been a reduction in overall crime in the Cumnock area, particularly pleasing is the reduction in crimes of violence. It is also pleasing to see the number of housebreakings to dwelling houses almost halving. Housebreakings to commercial premises show a slight increase, overall vehicle crime remains static, however housebreakings to garages and sheds show a decrease. Proactively tackling misuse of drugs has resulted in considerable success detecting drug related crime with a rise in the number of persons being reported for drug related crimes.

Beat 42 Lugar, Logan, Netherthird and Craigens

There has been a slight increase in the number of crimes of violence in the Lugar, Logan, Netherthird and Craigens area. Housebreakings to homes and commercial premises show a slight decrease, and the number of housebreakings to garages and sheds remain static. Vehicle crime shows a slight increase. Once again good proactive work has resulted in an increase in the number of persons reported for Drugs offences.

Beat 43 Auchinleck, Skares and Ochiltree

Once again there is an overall reduction in crime in the Auchinleck area. Particularly pleasing is the reduction in crimes of violence and housebreaking to dwelling houses, commercial property, garages and sheds. Vehicle crime shows an increase and proactively tackling misuse of drugs has resulted in considerable success detecting drug related crime.

Beat 44 Mauchline

There has been a reduction in overall crime in the Mauchline area. It is pleasing to note that crimes of violence have shown a marked decrease. It is also pleasing to see the number of housebreakings to dwelling houses, garages and sheds showing a marked decrease, as has vehicle crime. Housebreaking to commercial premises show a slight increase. Joint working between the various police departments and intelligence led policing in tackling misuse of drugs has resulted in considerable success detecting drug related crime.

Once again there has been a reduction in overall crime in the Catrine and Sorn area, it is very pleasing to note that crimes of violence have shown a marked decrease. Housebreakings to dwelling houses, garages and sheds, commercial premises and vehicle crime all show a decrease.

Beat 46 Muirkirk and Glenbuck

Once again there has been a slight reduction in overall crime in the Muirkirk and Glenbuck area. Crimes of violence remain static. It is very pleasing to see the number of housebreakings to dwelling houses, commercial premises, garages and sheds drop to almost zero, whilst Vehicle crime also shows a marked decrease.

Beat 47 New Cumnock

There has been an overall reduction in crime in the New Cumnock area. Crimes of violence have risen slightly (crimes of violence include Murder, Attempt Murder, Serious and Simple Assault). It should be noted that the only increase in this category is that of the number of simple assaults reported to the police, up from 12 to 21, with serious assaults remaining static at 3, The number of housebreakings to dwelling houses, garages and sheds have shown a marginal increase and at the same time housebreakings to commercial premises and vehicle crime has showed a slight decrease. Through intelligence led policing, high visibility patrols in the area, and partnership working with the community, efforts will continue to reduce crime in line with the other areas.

- 2.2** Overall in the Committee area, through high visibility policing and good work from various departments within the police it has resulted in a reduction in overall crime and particularly pleasing is the reduction in crimes of violence. It is also pleasing to see the number of housebreakings to dwelling houses, commercial property, garages & sheds and vehicle crime all falling. Through Joint working between various police departments and intelligence led

policing in tackling misuse of drugs there has been considerable success in detecting drug related crime.

- 2.3 The detection rate for group 1 – 7 crimes (all crimes and offences) in the committee area is currently running at 68%, which is an extremely favourable detection rate.
- 2.4 The Ayrshire Division Control Strategy for 2005 – 2006 focus' on Violent Crime, Acquisitive Crime, Vandalism and Anti Social behaviour. Efforts over the year will impact positively on the above figures.

3. OVERVIEW ON ANTI SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

- 3.1 Disorder offences, defined by the Scottish Executive as Breach of the Peace, Urinating in Public, Drunk and Incapable and Consumption of Alcohol in a Public Place.
- 3.2 Disorder offences rose from 434 to 481 within the designated period.
- 3.3 Vandalism has increased from 495 to 544 within the designated period and continues to be a particular problem in this area.
- 3.4 There are currently 5 Anti-Social Behaviour Orders in place within the committee Area. Local officers work closely with partner agencies including the Housing Department, Neighbourhood Disputes Team, SACRO mediation service as well as Shire Housing to address local concerns at the earliest opportunity by the most effective means.

4. CHANGES TO POLICE SERVICE DELIVERY

- 4.1 At present Strathclyde Police is undergoing a major change programme that will significantly improve our service to the public. The following is a brief outline of some of the projects and provides updated information in relation to the timescale. To enhance the service within East Ayrshire a mobile police office will replace the closure of certain police offices that are no longer required given the impact of the abovementioned improvements.
 - 4.1.1 **Airwave Radio:** Within Ayrshire the project will “go live” on or about 8th March 2006. This digital system provides enhanced coverage, clarity and security and is the foundation for further development within communications including telephony and mobile data. Every officer will be issued with a personal handset capable of contacting anyone on the extended police network in the UK. This will require increased security measures, which, cannot be done at the smaller offices.
 - 4.1.2 **Contact Centre:** The new Contact Centres will take all calls for Ayrshire from March 2006. This will mean that wherever a caller is, whatever number they dial the call will be diverted to a contact centre and will be answered quickly and professionally by trained and competent staff who will be able to deal with the calls efficiently. This will put an end to the current frustrations when trying

to call an individual police office and receiving the message “you are being held in a queue and will be answered shortly”. As this will increase the workload of the force, the structures need to be in place to deal with this but it will also provide a more accurate picture of the problems and issuing affecting the communities.

- 4.1.3 Area Control Room:** There is currently a police control room within East Ayrshire based at Kilmarnock. In March 2006 this will be replaced by an Area Control Room at Force Headquarters, Pitt Street, Glasgow. This will release staff locally for operational deployment and will provide a greater link to the Contact Centres.
- 4.1.4 Divisional Call Handling Unit:** This Unit has been operational at Ayr police office since September 2005 and takes calls from the public on police matters, which can be dealt with over the telephone. This directly reduces the demand on busy officers and the public feedback from this Unit has been very positive.
- 4.1.5 Community Police Officers:** Community Police officers have been able to forge excellent local relationships with Councillors, Community Councils, Residents Associations and others. These officers deal with local issues in conjunction with other services and this is true partnership working in action. All Community officers work closely with the wardens, anti-social behaviour investigative teams and partners to provide long-term solutions to problems.
- 4.1.6 Mobile Police Office:** A mobile police office has recently arrived in East Ayrshire. The Sub Divisional Officer, Superintendent Weir, has developed a schedule for the mobile office and parking locations have been identified to meet the needs of the local communities.
- 4.1.7 Police Offices:** Inspection reports have been received and recommend closure of some of the smaller offices. Many of these offices are in a poor state of repair. By closing smaller offices substantial revenue savings can be achieved which will then be directed towards further service improvements. The following police offices will close on 1st February 2006:

Muirkirk
Newmilns
Darvel
New Cumnock
Mauchline

The provision of the mobile office will be in place by this time and there will be no detrimental effect.

4.1.8 Conclusions: The changes and developments will lead to improvements in service delivery and provide East Ayrshire with a structure to face the challenges that lie ahead. Strathclyde Police is committed to tackling crime and criminals effectively in East Ayrshire and plays a leading role in making East Ayrshire safe. Updates will be provided to the local media to ensure they have accurate information and also the opportunity to report these changes.

5. LOCAL IMPACT

5.1 The foregoing changes will realise benefits of improved communications and safety for local officers and the communities they serve through much improved radio communications and more effective telephone handling.

5.2 At the new Contact Centres calls will be received by well trained and informed operators who will identify the most appropriate response to the callers needs. Calls will be directed to the Area control room for a priority response or to the Divisional Call Handling Unit or if appropriate making arrangements for the Community Officer to contact the caller at a mutually acceptable date and time.

5.3 The purpose of these changes is to improve the service to the public and will be driven specifically to achieve this therefore anyone who needs or wishes see a Police Officer in person will have that option.

5.4 The Divisional Call Handling Unit is already operational and initial feedback is very positive. Victims of minor crimes or offences can report these directly without the additional inconvenience of waiting for a Police Officer to attend at their address. Community Officers provide follow up enquiries and updates.

5.5 In the Cumnock Area the Community Officers will also benefit from the introduction of the Mobile Police Office. The schedule for the office includes regular visits to the smaller communities, which do not have a Police Office, and provides accommodation where members of the public can attend for advice, assistance or hand in found property. This vehicle will also be able to transport the Community Officers cycle for use on patrol in these communities.

5.6 The foregoing change programme represents a giant leap for Strathclyde Police in terms of structure and service delivery. This will improve the service local officers are able to provide to their communities and ensure they have the support required to provide a modern effective Police service committed to tackling crime and making the Cumnock Area even safer.

6. RECOMMENDATIONS
