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The results of the consultation on the proposals to open a base for children with special educational needs at Doon Academy, Dalmellington

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1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1** On 17 September 2002, the Education Committee approved the issue of a consultation document which made a proposal to establish a facility for children with special educational needs at Doon Academy, Dalmellington. A copy of the consultative document is attached as Appendix A.
- 1.2** The main issues raised in the consultative document were:
- * the requirement for the Council to achieve economy, efficiency and effectiveness in the use of resources
 - * secondary pupils with special educational needs from the Doon Valley area who are not integrated into mainstream provision have to travel some distance to specialist facilities
 - * such travel takes the children away from their community
 - * resources, which could be retained in East Ayrshire, and directly managed, are diverted elsewhere

2. THE CONSULTATION

- 2.1** Written representations on the Committee's proposals were sought from interested parties in terms of the Education (Publication and Consultation etc) (Scotland) Regulations 1981 and Amendment Regulations 1987, 1988 and 1989.
- 2.2** In accordance with statutory requirements, parents of the affected schools and the appropriate School Boards have been consulted. Copies of the consultation document were also made available to the staff of Doon Academy, and representatives of teacher and staff unions.
- 2.3** The existence of the document was publicised in the press and copies were made available in the Education Offices and affected schools and in the local community.
- 2.4** A meeting was arranged by the Director of Educational and Social Services in partnership with the Doon Academy School Board. This took place in Dalmellington on 30 October 2002 and was attended by parents and other interested individuals.

3. THE VIEWS EXPRESSED

- 3.1** Some correspondence was received on the proposals outlined in the document. A summary of respondents is included as Appendix B.
- 3.2** All respondents were in favour of the proposal. In many cases the responses were highly enthusiastic about this development. At the public meeting there was no adverse reaction, any questions and comments were directed to seeking clarification on points of detail about how the base would work.

4. COMMENTS ON THE VIEWS EXPRESSED

- 4.1** The very positive response indicates that all parts of the educational community are in favour of the proposal. There were no objections, nor suggestions that the proposal should be modified in any way.

5. CONCLUSION

- 5.1** Having carefully considered the responses made during the consultation period, there is no reason why the proposal should not go ahead as outlined in the consultation document.
- 5.2** To sum up, the conclusion reached is that taking forward this proposal would:
- * provide modern, forward looking, secure and excellent educational facilities for all children
 - * achieve better economy, efficiency and effectiveness in the use of the Council's resources
 - * significantly reduce the need to transport children with special educational needs to provision in areas remote from their home community
 - * provide a modern environment for children with special educational needs.
 - * Allow resources to be retained in East Ayrshire.

6. PROPOSAL

- 6.1** It is proposed, therefore, that a facility for children with special educational needs should be established at Doon Academy, Dalmellington. The capacity of Doon Academy (462 pupil places) and Nursery School (60 full time pupil places) would accommodate fully the needs of the estimated intake for the foreseeable future.

7. RECOMMENDATION

- 7.1** It is recommended that the Education Committee agree that:

- (i) a base for children with special educational needs should be established at Doon Academy, Dalmellington from August 2003, or as soon as possible thereafter; and
- (ii) pupils transfer to the new base on its completion, taking account of the wishes of the parents and children concerned and dependent upon the progress of building work; and
- (iii) otherwise note the contents of this report.

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Report by Director

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The Department of Educational and Social Services is committed to improving opportunities for all through quality, equality, access and partnership. In order to maintain this commitment it is necessary from time to time to systematically review the range and distribution of provision in given service areas.
- 1.2 The Local Government etc (Scotland) Act, 1994 places a duty on all Councils to exercise economy, efficiency and effectiveness in the use of resources. There is also a requirement under Section 15 of the Standards in Scotland's Schools etc Act 2000 to ensure that wherever possible children with special educational needs are educated in a mainstream setting.
- 1.3 East Ayrshire Council maintains an extensive commitment to support pupils with special educational needs. A wide range of resources have been developed over the years to allow both the non-segregation of pupils with special educational needs and provision of high quality specialist services. The Authority maintains a high level of financial commitment both in terms of placements with other authorities and in the transport of young people.
- 1.4 The proposals in this document result from a detailed consideration of these issues.

2. PRESENT POSITION

- 2.1 At present, East Ayrshire Council makes a range of provision for children with special educational needs. This includes specialist schools with complex and multiple learning difficulties. In addition Park School in Kilmarnock and the base at Cumnock Academy provide for children with moderate learning difficulties and who are of secondary age. There is an acknowledged shortfall in the south of the Authority and the establishments of a base for children with moderate learning difficulties would address the issue.

- 2.2** In 1998 the Authority established the Supported Learning Centre at Patna Primary School. This facility has proved to be highly successful. There is, however, no equivalent facility for secondary-aged pupils.
- 2.3** In the secondary aged population there are 20 children living in the Doon Valley area with special educational needs. Of these 6 are placed with South Ayrshire Council at the Mainholm Academy base, or elsewhere at a cost of £10,618 per pupil, at costs prevailing in 2001/2002. The remainder are integrated into mainstream provision, including the Cumnock Academy base which receives 4 pupils from the Doon Valley area. Places at the Cumnock Academy base are at a premium, with the base running at or above its capacity for the last 2 years.
- 2.4** For the primary-aged population there are 10 children with moderate learning difficulties in the Doon Valley area. 6 children attend the Supported Learning Centre at Patna Primary School.

2.5 DOON ACADEMY

Doon Academy is situated in the small town of Dalmellington approximately 12 Miles south-east of Ayr. The school serves Dalmellington, the Doon Valley and an extensive rural area towards the extreme southern boundary of the Authority. The associated primary schools are Bellsbank, Dalmellington, Littlemill and Patna. Dalrymple Primary School is also associated with Doon Academy for purposes of educational development and administration, but pupils attend Carrick Academy, Maybole in South Ayrshire. The location of Doon Academy is shown in Appendix 1.

The building is of modern construction. Part of the building is single storey, while the remainder is two storey. There is a lift available for pupil and staff use. In 2000 the building was adapted to accommodate Dalmellington Primary School. During 2002 extensive building work had to be undertaken due to traces of asbestos being found.

The building offers bright and modern accommodation. The school is adjacent to a swimming pool the use of which is well integrated into educational programmes. All necessary educational facilities together with a dining room are already on site. The entrance area has been re-modelled and access for the disabled has been provided.

Doon Academy has a present planning capacity of 516, the current roll is 397.

3. MAIN ISSUE

- 3.1** Currently, secondary pupils with special educational needs from the Doon Valley area who are not integrated into mainstream provision have to travel to special schools or units in South Ayrshire or to schools in the Kilmarnock or Cumnock areas. This takes them away from their community and peer group. It also means that some resources, which could be retained in East Ayrshire, and directly managed, are diverted elsewhere.

4. PROPOSAL

- 4.1** It is proposed that a specialised facility for a maximum of 20 pupils be developed within the surplus accommodation of Doon Academy with effect from August 2003 or as soon as possible thereafter.

5. REASONS FOR THE PROPOSAL

- 5.1** There will be a number of advantages from this proposal:

- a) young people will be educated within their community.
- b) there will be continuity from the Patna Supported Learning Centre
- c) Funds saved from inter-authority payments will be retained within East Ayrshire.
- d) there will be economies from reduced pupil travel.
- e) support from East Ayrshire professional services such as educational psychology and social work will be facilitated.
- f) there will be limited extension to local employment
- g) parental liaison will be facilitated
- h) it will fulfil the requirements imposed by recent changes in the law.
- i) it will provide an alternative to the Cumnock Base

6. IMPLICATIONS OF THE PROPOSAL

6.1 Staff

Staffing levels for the Centre would be as set out in SJNC TSSE SE/81.

Based on a roll of 20 pupils the teaching staff entitlement would be 3.6 FTE inclusive of one principal teacher post:

1 x principal teacher* @ £32,817	£32,817
2.6 x teachers @ £28,707	£74,638
0.6 x SEN auxiliary @ £12,771	£7663
Employment costs @ 20.1%	<u>£23,139</u>
TOTAL	£138,257

In addition the needs of the school population would be taken into account.

*subject to job sizing under “A Teaching Profession for the 21st Century”

The principal teacher would report to a nominated depute headteacher of Doon Academy and thereafter to the headteacher.

6.2 There would be no effect on community use of the school under this proposal.

6.3 It is envisaged that accommodation will be utilised alongside existing classroom space to be identified by the headteacher in consultation with staff. This will result in a considerable enhancement of the school’s facilities.

7. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF THE PROPOSAL

7.1 The minimum estimated revenue savings arising from this proposal per annum would be:

a. Inter authority payments	£21,236
b. Transport costs	<u>£10,000</u>
Total	£31,236

7.2 The staffing costs would be £138,257.

7.3 The facility will also require an allocation of classroom supplies and other running costs in line with equivalent establishments in the special educational needs sector. There will also be initial start-up costs to include furniture fittings and equipment. This will be £10,000. These costs would be met from the National Priorities Action Fund.

8. SUMMARY OF THE PROPOSAL

8.1 Under this proposal, a facility for special educational needs will be established at Doon Academy, Dalmellington. This development will be a significant improvement to the range of educational opportunities and services available in the Doon Valley area. It will be a considerable enhancement of the facilities of Doon Academy itself. Establishment of this facility will provide continuity from the Patna Supported Learning Centre and thereby ensure that the needs of children with special educational needs will be met within their own community.

9. RECOMMENDATIONS

9.1 It is recommended that the Education Committee agrees to adopt the proposals that

- (i) a facility for pupils with special educational needs should be established within the building occupied by Doon Academy.
- (ii) the facility should be managed by the headteacher of Doon Academy.
- (iii) the facility should make provision for secondary school aged children, or in appropriate circumstances young people covered by the legislation on Records of Needs or its equivalent.
- (iv) this facility should be established at start of session 2003, or as soon as possible thereafter.

It is also recommended that:

- (i) this report be issued as a consultative document and made available to all interested parties.
- (ii) all interested parties including the relevant school board be invited to make written representation to John Mulgrew, Director of Educational and Social Services, Council Headquarters, London Road, Kilmarnock no later than Friday 1 November 2002; and
- (iii) the Director prepare a report on the results of the consultative process for consideration at a future meeting of the Education Committee.

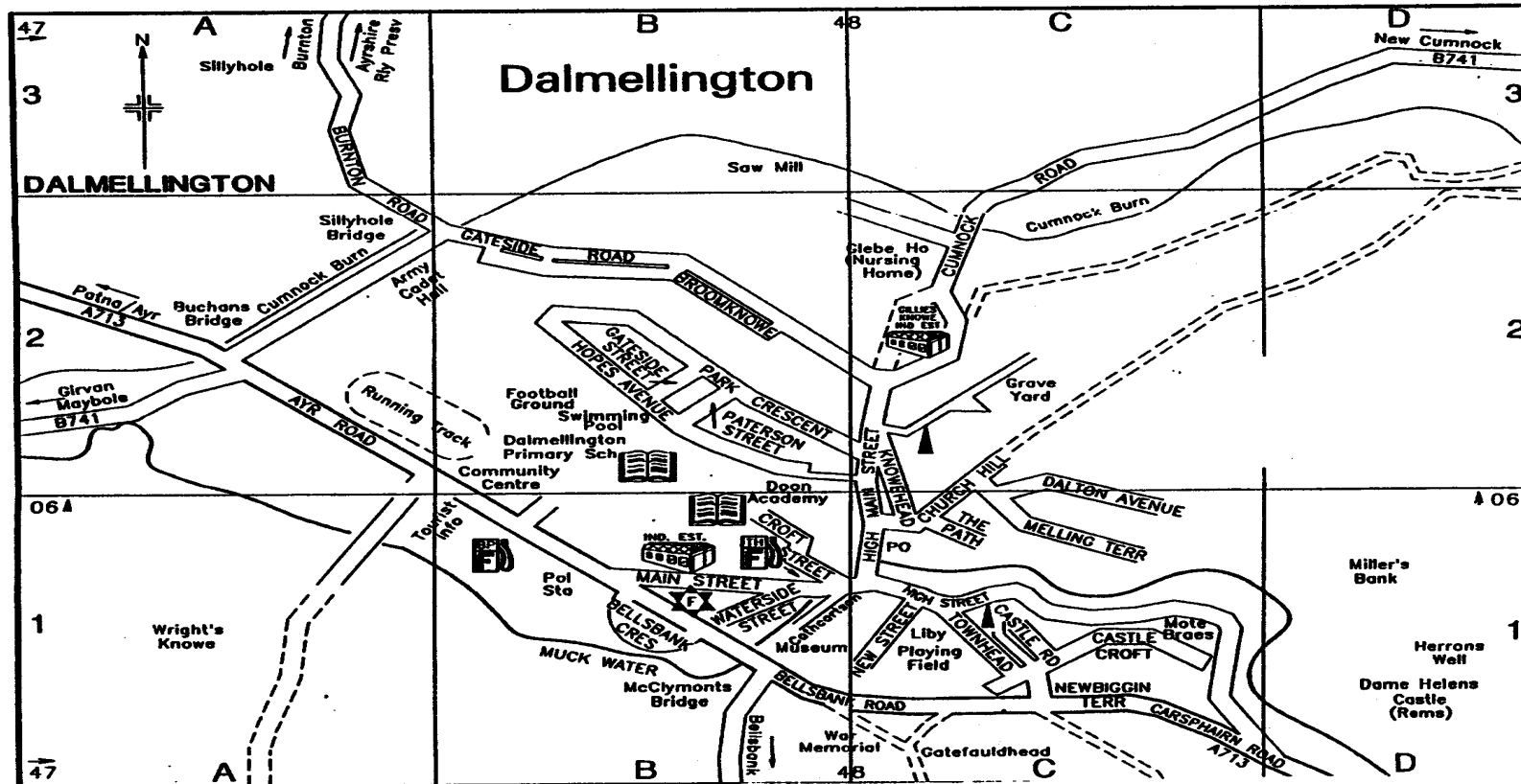
